Dear sisters and brothers in Christ!

In his letter to the Ephesians, the apostle Paul writes:

... be kind to one another, compassionate, forgiving one another, just as God

in Christ has forgiven you. (Ephesians 4:32)

The nature of God is to be a forgiving God. He wants that for you and for me. He sent John the Baptist so that the people would repent of their sins and be forgiven by God. Jesus came into the world to give us salvation and forgiveness.

May a father forgive his son and a daughter forgive her mother. May brother and sister reconcile and celebrate Christmas at the same table. May a husband forgive his wife and both continue to learn to live in love and raise their children. May a Ukrainian and a Russian start talking to each other again, and a Jew and an Arab sit down to dinner at the same table. And let Jesus Christ, Emmanuel - God with us - be invisibly present at every table (Gospel of Matthew 1:23).

It is very important to forgive others and to receive God's forgiveness yourself. Many people live with guilt and do not believe that God can forgive them. The consequence is a life of depression. But the Bible gives us hope and faith in a forgiving God. The prophet Micah encourages us:

> Who is a God like You, who pardons wrongdoing and passes over a rebellious act of the remnant of His possession? He does not retain His anger forever, because He delights in mercy. He will again take pity on us; He will trample on our wrongdoings. (Book of Micah 7:18-19)
